

Policies and Procedures Update

The Board, in consultation with our lawyers, has updated our Conflict of Interest and our Whistleblower policies, as well as approved a new Policy on Compensation (printed below). These and all other policies can be found on our website, in the Members Only section, under the section "Policies and Procedures." These policies just mentioned pertain to our status as a New York State not-forprofit corporation. Also posted there are our policies on Reimbursement of Expenses and on Lapsed Key-holder Membership, as well as all the policies pertaining to Camp Nawakwa and Sponsors/Applicants. The website provides an efficient, effective, and easily accessible place for all members to keep up-to- date on all the policies and practices of the New York Chapter. If you haven't seen it yet, our new Hosting Manual is also posted to the website (in the Members Only section). On the Home page, under Membership, can also be found our new Sponsor/Applicant Handbook. Elections Note: Each year we have elections for New York Chapter Board member positions. Our elections last year for new Board members followed the requirements of New York State Not-for-Profit Corporation law for the first time. Moving forward, the Board has decided that future elections will take place at the Annual Board Meeting and that the Annual Board Meeting will be held the weekend after Labor Day. This year's Annual Board Meeting and Elections will be Saturday, September 8 th, 2018.

Policy on Compensation

The New York Chapter is one of the Chapters of the Adirondack Mountain Club (Main Club) and is a New York State Non-for-Profit 501(C)7 Corporation. The New York Chapter operates as a volunteer organization, without any paid staff. Although the New York State Non-Profit Corporation law (Section 58, paragraph b) states: "A corporation may pay compensation in a reasonable amount to members, directors, or officers, for services rendered," it shall be the policy of the New York Chapter that no member of the Board of Directors. no Committee member, and no Chapter member, shall receive compensation for the performance of their roles and duties, or services rendered, on behalf of the Chapter. (Ordinary and expected/approved expenses will be reimbursed, as per the Policy on Reimbursement of Expenses)

The Annual Nawakwa Passport - 2018

The Annual Nawakwa Passport for 2018 is now available for all Key-holders. The Annual Passport, which covers the Day Fees for all visits to camp per calendar year, is \$150 per individual Key-holder and is non-transferable. If a Passport holder brings spouse, children, other family members or guests to camp, these other must pay the appropriate Camp Fees, as usual. All Key-holders should be familiar with, and follow, the Guest Policy and the Hosting Policy. Note: Because of our new Policy on Compensation, Passport holders who volunteer to host at Camp Nawakwa are not allowed to claim any credit toward next year's Annual Passport.

2018 Conservation Committee Update - New York Chapter

This summer the Conservation Committee shifted gears and began a cooperative effort with the New York/New Jersey Trail Conference to eradicate the invasive Aralia tree in Harriman Park. Through a series of hikes, we were able to map Aralia trees over approximately one square mile and submit this information over to NYNJTC. In addition to the mapping efforts, we conducted three hikes to apply specialty herbicides as a limited basal bark treatment. These applications were done over a 14.5 acre area around the Green Pond area, near Lake Stahahe. As a 40-year veteran New York State Pesticide Applicator, I was able to piggy back on the NYNJTC Invasive Strike Force Park permits. Our team also removed the seed heads on numerous Aralia trees that we could not reach to make herbicide treatments. The first application was in mid-July and when we returned in late-August all the treated trees were dead, with little to no collateral damage. The approximate total number of tree "stems" killed is about 500. We have killed 95-100% of the Aralia in this 14.5 acre Green Pond area. The plan for the upcoming year will be to continue the Aralia eradication program with NYNJTC. There will be a late-July (July 23) hike and camp-out at the Bald Rocks lean-to to continue the herbicide treatments, remove seed head, and continue the mapping process. In 2018, our ability to make herbicide treatments will be increased, since Nawakwa applicant Katie Bronson (a NYS Pesticide Applicator) will be added to the NYNJTC Strike Force applicator list.

Make Your Own Tick Repellent

In a spray bottle, mix 2 cups of apple cider vinegar and 1 cup of water. (Ticks hate the smell and taste of vinegar, and will be easily be repelled by this ingredient alone.)

Add 20 drops of your favorite essential oil. Eucalyptus oil is a calm, soothing scent that also works as a tick repellent, while peppermint and citrus oils give off a strong crisp scent that repels ticks. (This way you won't smell like bitter vinegar all day!)

Place the top onto the bottle and shake well.

After mixing the solution, spray onto clothing, skin, and hair before going outdoors. Reapply every four hours to keep ticks at bay, and examine the skin and hair when returning home to make sure no ticks are on the body.


