

As hikers, one of the things we take for granted is the act of walking. Only after we experience an injury that sidelines us for a while, or we begin to feel the wear and tear of age that slows us down and reminds us we don't have the flexibility and balance we had when we were younger, sometimes only then do we begin to appreciate what seemed such a simple thing: Walking

Walking, however, is not a simple act, but one that was developed over a long time for each of us. We usually don't remember the gradual and painstaking way we learned to walk. From the crawling of the infant, to the unsteady first steps of the toddler, all the falls and scraped knees and hurts, the being picked up after a fall, and the hand-holding and encouragement we receive from our parents to keep taking those first steps - it was all hard work and it took a long time. Bones and muscles had to grow and strengthen, our sense of balance and coordination had to develop - all of this taking years of hard effort of which we have, probably, no real memory. What we do have, though, is the end result: That sense of exhilaration and the joy of locomotion, the smile of the child running and playing, having fun, and delighting in the ability to move, run and jump. Runners talk about the joy of running. As hikers, we also know the delight and satisfaction we can experience by 'getting out' into the woods and onto the hiking trails.

Over the past two years, we have been putting together various policies and procedures that function to systematize and standardize best practices for the New York Chapter and Camp Nawakwa. Adjusting and adapting to all these regulations can sometimes seem



difficult and tedious. This is not unlike what we had to go through in learning how to walk and to take good care of ourselves. As children, we began to learn some of the laws of physics in all the falls and tumbles we took. We also needed to learn some of the man-made rules (cross at the green; look both ways before crossing the street). The goal of this learning, both in childhood and now, is that we achieve an ease of manner and movement that provides us a way to enjoy our abilities and our interactions with the world and one another.

Mastery is defined as the "knowledge and skill that allows you to do, use, or understand something very well." Built into the idea of mastery are the key ingredients of learning and practicing. We have been engaged in such learning and practicing as we re-discover who and what we are and as we endeavor to 'master' all these protocols. And the goal of these efforts is to achieve a joy in all



that we do, as Chapter members and as Nawakwans: To come to experience "great pleasure, satisfaction and delight" and a "feeling of well-being and contentment" each time we come together and cooperate with one another for the harmonious running of the New York Chapter and Camp Nawakwa.

ADK-NY Conservation Committee Project: Invasive Tree Control in Harriman State Park

This CC project will be conducted in conjunction with the NY/NJTC and comprises two events which the ADK-NY Board has approved as qualifying, suitable for applicants. Each event can be used by applicants as hiking or service, but not both. The overall project goal is to identify and control the invasive Aralia tree. Don Gabel proposed this project to the NY/NJTC and it was approved. Harriman State Park (HSP) authorities are awaiting GPS points to approve locations. Once the locations are approved by HSP, ADK-NY can proceed with the second, or control, event. The first event, to identify locations of the Aralia tree and record their GPS points, will take place on Saturday, July 22. The hike will be to the Green Pond and Bald Rock areas. Meeting at 8:00 a.m. at the Hiker's Parking Lot on Route 106, we will proceed north on Island Pond Road, continuing west on the Yellow Trail to the Green Pond area. There are Aralia trees in this area and we will record their GPS points. From there, we will backtrack and hike the Yellow Trail to the White Bar Trail. We will hike north, eat lunch on the Yellow Trail, then hike the Ramapo-Dunderberg Trail to the Bald Rocks area. In this area, we will record GPS points of Aralia that are scattered along the ridge. We will hike back to the parking lot, continuing south on the Ramapo-Dunderburg Trail to the Nurian Trail, where we go west back to the White Bar Trail. As a bonus to hikers, new applicant Ms. Katy Bronson, will identify and talk about native and invasive trees. Hikers should bring their own lunch and adequate water for the daylong event. This hike is about 6 miles.

The next event will take place August 19. The hike in to the HSP-approved locations is the same as the first event. When we get to the GPS points, hikers will cut the tops off the Aralia trees and Don will spray herbicide on the stems. Under provisions Linda Rohleder (NY/NJTC) has with HSP, Don is permitted to spray herbicides. He will be the only one spraying. Hikers should bring their own lunch and adequate water for the daylong event. Please RSVP to Don Gabel at blaugabels@msn.com or 845-359-7518 for either event by 5:00 p.m. the preceding day.

Hosting Policy for Camp Nawakwa

Policy on Hosting During the Camp Season (May 1st-October 15th)

- 1 The Board has over-all charge of the calendar for Camp Nawakwa.
- 2. Only Key-holders are allowed to host.
- a. An announcement of when the camp calendar is open will be sent by the Board to all Keyholders by March 1st of any year.
- 3. Each hosted event (whether Weekends or Midweek) is allowed only one official Host (and a Cohost, if desired), both of whom are Key-holders.
- 4. When a Key-holder is Hosting or Co-hosting, that Key-holder is not allowed to bring guests to camp.
- a. It is a fundamental contradiction to expect that any such Key-holder bringing up guests to camp should, at the same time, have the responsibility for hosting and being in charge of camp.
- b. If the Hosting or Co-hosting Key-holder has a spouse or significant other who is also a Key-holder, but who is not involved in hosting the event, that other Key-holder would be allowed to bring guests to camp. (See also: Guest Policy).

 5. Day Fees are waived for Key-holders who volunteer to host.
- a. A \$10 credit per each day's hosting (up to a maximum of \$50) is offered to those hosts or cohosts who hold an Annual Passport, which credit can be used for the purchase of the next year's Annual Passport. The Passport holder is free to decline the credit.

Policy on Hosting During the Off-Season (October 16th to April 30th)

- 1. Permission is always needed from the Park to access and use Camp Nawakwa when the camp is officially closed.
- a. If a Key-holder desires to be at camp during the Off-Season, whether for the day or for an overnight(s), the Key-holder must notify the Chapter Chair who will contact the Park Office to request permission.
- 2. When Hosting during the Off-Season:
- a. Only Key-holders are allowed to host.
- b. There can be only one official host for the event (and a Co-host if desired). As mentioned above, Hosts are not allowed to bring guests to camp.
- c. Day Fees are waived for Key-holders who volunteer to host.
- d. A \$10 credit per each day's hosting (up to a maximum of \$50) is offered to those hosts or cohosts who hold an Annual Passport, which credit can be used for the purchase of the next year's Annual Passport. The Passport holder is free to decline the credit.)

Guest Policy for Camp Nawakwa

- 1. With certain limitations, as outlined in this policy, Key-holders are allowed to invite guests to camp.
- 2. An individual Key-holder may bring two guests to camp at any one time. (Note: A Key-holder may bring up their immediate family members as guests, even if this exceeds the two guests per Key-holder limit, but no additional guests.)
- 3. Guests (with the exception of the Key-holder's immediate family members) may be at camp for a total of three visits/events per year:
- a. A visit/event may be a day-visit, or an over-night. One over-night, either mid-week or weekend, would be considered one visit/event.
- b. These visits/events may not be consecutively linked.
- c. After being a guest for a year, the adult guest is encouraged to become an Applicant.
- 4. The Key-holder will ensure that all camp and Park rules (especially those of the Waterfront) are explained to and followed by all guests, whether adults or minors.
- a. The Key-holder is responsible for their guests during their visit to Nawakwa and must be present with the guests while at camp. Minors under 16 shall at all times be supervised.
- b. The Key-holder will offer guidance and explanation of camp life, and will ensure that the guest has a safe and enjoyable visit.

A Note to Sponsors and Applicants

As per our long-standing practice, each Applicant for Nawakwa membership has the help of two Sponsors during the Applicant's Qualifying period (a twelve-month period during which an Applicant must satisfactorily complete five Qualifying Events plus meet with their Sponsors). A Sponsor is a current, active Nawakwan who has been a Keyholder for at least one year and who agrees to help the Applicant learn about camp and the responsibilities of membership so that the Applicant may successfully complete the process of qualifying. Sponsors will meet three times with their Applicant (signing the Qualifications form at each meeting) and will:

- A) Assist the prospective Nawakwan in understanding and appreciating the history of the New York Chapter and Camp Nawakwa
- B) Instruct and guide the Applicant in taking up their responsibilities for the good running of Camp Nawakwa
- C) Provide orientation to the general Policy and Procedures of the Chapter
- $\ensuremath{\mathrm{D}})$ Provide in-put to the Board of Directors who vote on the Applicant for Key-holder status

A new Sponsor - Applicant Handbook (accessed on our website under the Membership Section) is presented as a tool to be used by the Sponsors and Applicants during the three orientation meetings. This handbook highlights many important areas that need to be understood, but the handbook is an introduction and is not exhaustive of the many areas that can be covered. This handbook is to be used in conjunction the other resources we have: A new Hosting Manual(also accessed on our website); our website itself(e.g. Documents of interest section, which includes our Bylaws, and the Policies and Procedures section); and the Trail Marker.

Special attention in these meetings should be given to: The Applicant's understanding of the hosting tradition of Camp Nawakwa and of the hosts responsibilities; the Bathing Beach Safety Plan and Waterfront Regulations; and the general responsibilities and expectations of being a Key-holder member of the Camp Nawakwa community. A tour of all the camp area, including the waterfront and tenting areas, as well as an in-depth tour of the Main Cabin and kitchen should also be included. Above all, Applicants should get to experience first-hand "the spirit of cooperation, teamwork, mutual respect and camaraderie that we call the Nawakwa Tradition."


