Notice: ADK Fall Outing September 18-20, 2020

The ADK Fall Weekend will be held in the Old Forge/Inlet Area on September 18-20 with headquarters (trips, food and lodging) at the Adirondack Woodcraft Camps. The Onondaga Chapter of the ADK is offering ADK members their families and friends a rich Adirondack experience with a selection of outings for all interests and abilities. Our outings will feature hiking in old growth forests, mountain biking on professionally built trails at McCauley Mountain, climbing fire towers that are part of the ADK Challenge, paddling on the Moose River and several lakes. You can earn a patch by completing the Fulton Chain Trifecta during the weekend. Participants can hike two sections of the North Country National Scenic Trail and explore the Pigeon Lake Wilderness. We even offer a docent led tour of Camp Sagamore.

The Adirondack Woodcraft Camps is a rustic outdoor setting only 7-miles from Old Forge, at the end of Rondaxe Road and nestled in the wilderness on a 250 acre property complete with two private lakes, access to the Moose River and freedom to enjoy hiking and biking trails without leaving the property. Off-Season at Camp Nawakwa

[Note: As of early January, and this edition of the *Trail Marker*, there are no Hosted Events planned for the months of January, February, March. As per our Lease and the policy of Harriman State Park, the Camp Season for any year runs from May 1st to October 15^{th.} The other months are considered 'Off-Season'. During the Off-Season, Keyholders, with permission of the Park, may access and use Camp Nawawkwa. The policy for off-season use of Camp is below.]

- 1. During the Off-Season (October 16th to April 30th), when the camping season is officially closed, permission to make use of Camp Nawakwa is needed from the Park Office.
- 2. Any Keyholder member who wishes to access and use camp during the Off-Season must notify the Chapter Chair who will contact the Park Office to request permission and obtain the necessary Permit. Members should contact the Chapter Chair five days before the requested visit date so that sufficient time can be allowed for the Park Office to be notified and respond.
- 3. All the normal Park Rules and Regulations, and the Chapter's established Policy and Procedures, will be in effect during the Off-Season.

Guest Policy for Camp Nawakwa (Revised)

With certain limitations, as outlined in this policy, Keyholders are allowed to invite guests to camp. An individual Keyholder in good standing may bring four guests to camp at any one time. (Note: A Keyholder may bring up their immediate family members as guests, even if this exceeds the four guests per Keyholder limit, but no additional guests.) More than four guests requires additional prior host approval for hosted times.

- 1. Guests (with the exception of the Keyholder's immediate family members) may be at camp for a total of three visits/events per year:
 - a. A visit/event may be a day-visit, or an over-night. One over-night, either mid-week or weekend, would be considered one visit/event.
 - b. These visits/events may not be consecutively linked.
 - c. After being a guest for a year, the adult guest is encouraged to become an Applicant.
- 2. The Keyholder will ensure that all camp and Park rules (especially those of the Waterfront) are explained to and followed by all guests, whether adults or minors.
 - a. The Keyholder is responsible for their guests during their visit to Nawakwa and must be present with the guests while at camp. Minors under 16 shall at all times be supervised.
 - b. The Keyholder will offer guidance and explanation of camp life and will ensure that the guest has a safe and enjoyable visit. (Revised 12/08/19)

Annual Palm Sunday Hike

to St. John's Church in the Wilderness Sunday – April 5, 2020

The annual Palm Sunday hike to St. John's Church in the Wilderness has been a tradition since the 1930's. Other groups from other hiking clubs are out this day headed to St. John's and it is very common to cross paths with them as we hike along. The Church service begins at 3 PM and is followed by a wonderful buffet at the barn across from the Church provided by the parishioners. We will go by a 'traditional' route that will take us along Breakneck Pond (where we can take a lunch break) and which passes through the AMC camp. Since this is a one-way hike, please note: All who are driving should meet at the Church by 9:30 AM where the cars will be parked. All cars, except for the one or two that will shuttle hikers/drivers back to our starting point, will be left at the Church where the hike finishes. The hike will start from the Camp road and Seven Lakes Drive about 10 AM. The buffet finishes about 5 PM. The drivers of the cars left at the ADK Camp road will be driven back to their cars after the event.

Although Palm Sunday is in April this year, the late Winter weather can be very changeable. Rain, some cold, blustery weather, including snow and ice, are always a possibility. Participants should dress warmly (layers, no cotton), bring lunch, snacks, water, rain-gear, and wear sturdy hiking shoes. Traction devices are recommended in case there is ice on the trail. The address of the church is 119 Johnstown Road, Stony Point, NY in between Lake Welch Parkway and Route 106. "I met Ann at Nawakwa, and we enjoyed many weekends and hikes in Harriman. She was an excellent hiker. Later on, we sometimes came up for the day with fellow-member Shirley Luban to swim and picnic. One of Ann's last weekends at Camp was the big July 4th event hosted in 2013 by Laura Sunderlin when the power suddenly went out. Laura and Noel Schulz somehow got a generator going and the large crowd had a lovely, surprisingly low-key time that holiday weekend, which Ann enjoyed very much.

"Ann was a staunch supporter of many environmental groups and political causes. For many years, she was active in the NY-NJ Trail Conference as a Board Member, working closely with the Executive Director on numerous projects.

"Above all, Ann was an outstanding friend, a woman known for her generosity, her kindness, and her willingness to share her insights and perspective on life without forcing her views on others. She was a gentle persuader.

"Ann and I shared many memorable moments, often in the realm of art. We loved exhibitions at "the Met," as well as films, operas, concerts and dance performances. Ann herself was a fine artist, and the wonderful paintings in her home, as well as many of her beautiful vases, platters and cups, were her own.

"But Ann's main talent was for friendship, for making people feel special and valued. Birthdays were always celebrated. Ann enriched my life, and the lives of many others. I will not be able to replace her as friend, mentor or companion." - Daphne Prior

The Centennial of the Adirondack Mountain Club and the New York Chapter

[The marking of a hundred years is always a notable occasion whether it be for an individual, an event, or an organization. The 100th Anniversary of the Adirondack Mountain Club (Main Club) and of the New York Chapter will take place in 2022. As a way to count down to the anniversary, the *Trail Marker*, beginning with this issue, will present articles about the history, significant events, and the people connected to the development of the Main Club and the New York Chapter over these one-hundred years. - Ray Kozma, Editor]

The Beginning of the Adirondack Mountain Club

"The Adirondack Mountain Club, popularly known as "the ADK" was founded in 1922 as an organization for people interested in promoting conservation, recreation, and education in the Adirondack Mountain region of New York State. It has since grown substantially from 208 charter members to over 20,000 members enrolled at large and in one of many chapters situated throughout New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania.

"The idea of forming the ADK was conceived by Meade C. Dobson, who was then an official of the New York State Association of Real Estate Boards as well as the Palisades Interstate Park Trail Conference. He believed there was need for a private organization that could help the State develop trails and shelters which would make remote areas of the Adirondacks better accessible to hikers and backpackers. Encouraged by the initial support of his idea from George D. Pratt, Conservation Commissioner of New York State, and William G. Howard, Superintendent of Forests, Dobson invited other like-minded individuals to a special pre-organization meeting held on December 5, 1921, at the Log Cabin atop Abercrombie & Fitch sporting goods store in New York City. From the 40 people present, an organization committee was formed, including representatives of outing, recreational, educational, government, and business interests. In addition, they formed a Charter Membership Committee.

"Plans were quickly formulated and on April 3, 1922, 75 of the 208 certified charter members attended the formal organization meeting at the A & F Log Cabin. They proceeded to organize the club by electing executive officers and a board of governors and adopting the constitution and bylaws. Within two weeks a certificate of incorporation was filed with the New York State Government, that was officially granted April 25, 1922. Among the stated objectives in the Certificate of Incorporation was to develop and maintain trails; to construct and maintain campsites, open shelters (lean-tos), and permanent camps, maintain a bureau of information about the Adirondacks, publish maps and guidebooks, and educate the public regarding the conservation of natural resources and prevention of forest fires.

"In October [10/13] 1922, ADK held a general business meeting at the Lake Placid Club, in which the main item on the agenda was a motion presented at the April Meeting by Warwick Carpenter regarding Mountain slope protection and recreational development. To deal with the motion, a conservation committee was formed with Henry S. Graves, Dean of Yale Forestry School, as chairman. The committee presented a report rejecting the Carpenter proposal as being too specific as to areas to be acquired. The Executive Committee approved the conservation committee's

"rejection, which was subsequently endorsed by the majority of members. Also, at this meeting the club formally recognized the establishment of local chapters at Albany and New York City. In January 1923, ADK held its first annual meeting in which the membership received reports submitted by the club officers, committees, and local chapters. The election officers and governors also took place." [Excerpt taken from: NYSED / OCE / NYSL / Manuscripts and Special Collections / Finding Aids / Adirondack Mountain Club Records]

Early History of the New York Chapter

"Raymond H. Torrey was the first Chair of the New York Chapter. In the fall of 1922, he was asked by the Board of Governors of the Main Club to organize local walks for members in the Metropolitan area. In January 1923, he issued a small two-page outing schedule. Another schedule was issued in the Spring.

"Formal organization of the Chapter began in the summer of 1923 when George A. R. (Bill) Mead was appointed Chairman by the Board of Governors after Raymond Torrey asked to be relieved. Bill Mead appointed officers and built up an active Chapter membership of about 250. He relinquished the office to Evart G. Routzahn in October 1924. The original Constitution and By-laws were drawn up and adopted under Evart Routzahn's tenure." [Excerpts from: History by Ira Ayers on the occasion of the New York Chapter's 50th Anniversary]
