


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Chapter Chair's Message by Ed O'Donnell





Summer is in full swing and while it took us a bit of time to fill the hosting schedule, we look to have a fairly complete schedule. The September 4th Fall Outing deadline for registration is fast approaching and we need your commitment to come and make this a success. The organizing committee has worked extremely hard, lining up leaders for many hikes, kayak ventures and bike rides. Please help support not only our Chapter, but the Main Club.

At our Annual Meeting we had good news from a consulting architect, Winston Perry. Mr. Perry has 35 plus years of experience as a professional architect, much of it involved with restoring historic, Adirondak buildings. Overall, his impression was that the structure was in good condition and stable, given its age. The porch seems stable and the roof in good condition. The spreading of the roof from the weight of snow had been a concern of ours, but he seemed to think that it was not critical. Spreading could have occurred in the first year of the building. Our plan will be to measure the spread now and see if, over time, it worsens. Also, if so, he has suggested that we install two tie-rods along the beams to support the roof and prevent spreading. This solution is not very expensive or difficult to implement, but we will need to propose this to the Park and get permission (and a lease credit).

Of greater concern was the water damage to the rear wall of the cabin. One can easily see that the wooden shingles are rotted as they touch the ground. We will be addressing this issue also, though it may take some time. Lastly, the Park has already replaced the electrical mast on top of the cabin: it was bent. They have promised to address the giant pothole in the road, remove the dead tree by cabin 4 (sometime in the Fall), and repair or replace our swim raft (it sinks to one side). The new Park Group Camps Director, Bill Ledwitz, has been very helpful and supportive.

Now Hear This

Old televisions don't fade away. Like reruns they continue to turn up long after their useful lives have ended. They and other electronic devices, including cell phones and computers may contain mercury, cadmium, arsenic and possibly bromated flame retardants. The picture tube of an older T.V. may contain 4-8 pounds of lead. These substances are harmful to us and the environment, and must be disposed of properly. Planting old cell phones in a landfill, where their toxic substances can leach into groundwater, or incinerating T.V.s to produce dangerous gasses, is not the answer.

Nine states and New York City have recycling laws making manufacturers responsible for disposing of their products. Major manufacturers, including Zenith, Nokia and Sharp will recycle their products.

Needed is a statewide recycling program that requires makers to take back their products, at no cost to the consumer, recycle components, and properly dispose of toxic materials. The program would be monitored by the DEC. Offenders

would be subject to civil penalties.

These provisions are covered in an e-waste take back bill (A-7571) that passed the NYS Assembly this year. A similar bill, S-2512, awaits attention in the Senate. Both houses are scheduled to re-convene in Albany this fall.

Don't be in a "dead zone". Make your voice heard.

Urge you senator to take action on e-waste take back.

What I Learned Mid-Week Hosting By Steve Zubarik, Director

When Ernie Kriese and I mid-week hosted in July, I learned some things about other Harriman camps. I hope they're of general interest. We went to a group camp meeting of the Palisades Camp Association at the Mason camp, K-20.

The PCA is an organization of camp directors that helps each other with mutual problems, trades insurance and contractor information, and requests (as a group) the park administration to solve camp problems. The park's group camp director, Bill Ledwitz was there answering questions. Bill was an active Nawakwan in the 90's.

The most serious item discussed was roof repair and asbestos abatement of camp buildings. There are 175 buildings that currently need roof repair. The park will repair them, but by

the time they get to it, the buildings are sometimes ruined. Camp directors want a repair schedule so they know whether to pay for repairs themselves or wait for the park repair.

There are recycling containers at five camps for general camp use. Only one site has been successful, Mason camp. The others containers were so contaminated with trash that their contents went into the garbage. There was a discussion on how to keep garbage out of recycle containers.

Some other tidbits:

The Mason camp is an impressive group of buildings. They're celebrating their 90th anniversary this year. The general public can have dinner there every day except Monday during the season. Call before 3:00 for a reservation. They're just west of the closed bridge on route 106. It's a 10 minute walk from Kanawaukee parking. The bridge is expected to re-open in September. However, I looked at the bridge. No work has been done yet.

Ray, the director of Baker camp was at the meeting. She and her husband have been running the camp for 43 years. Baker camp also serves meals. It's a short canoe ride away.

There are places to explore in the park even for those of us who prefer to eating to hiking.

PS: The second week in July is a good time to pick and eat blueberries.

Saturday, September 5 • Bonticou Crag/Table Rocks Table Rocks is a spectacular rock formation with great views. From there rock scramble thru cracks, crevices and caves. Not for the faint of heart or those concerned about height or exposure. Leader sets the pace. No beginners or stragglers. Hiking boots and 2 qts. Water required. Steady rain cancels, call if in doubt. Joint with AMC and qualifying. \$10 Mohonk Preserve fee. Moderate pace with steep ups and downs and scrambles – about 7 miles.

Transportation:8:30am Adirondack Trailways. Ticket office is in South Wing of the Port Authority. Take bus to New Paltz, Ulster County, NY, arrive at 10:05. Meet at the bus station. Drivers take NYS Thruway to Exit 18, then route 299 West 1 mile. Park on side street, NOT in the station.

Sunday, September 13 • Lake Welch

A delightful getaway in an area not often explored. We'll be guests of the SBM, LP, and Beech trails. Around 8 miles at a moderate pace. It is not necessary to register, but you must call or preferably email me beforehand to make sure that the hike is on, and if you need or can offer a ride from NYC. Take the 9:11 Jersey Transit train from Penn Sta., changing at Secaucus for the 9:31 Port Jervis train to Sloatsburg, arriving 10:12. (Fare: RT \$15.50/Srs.\$10) Or, take the 9:10 ShortLine bus from PABT arr. Sloatsburg 10:07. (Fare: RT \$25.90/Srs.\$12.90). Out in time for the 4:28 train back to Penn Sta. Qualifying.

Sunday, September 20 • Mt. Taurus

A long uphill, but rewarded with spectacular views of the Hudson Valley. It is not necessary to register, but you must call or preferably email me beforehand to make sure that the hike is on, and if you need or can offer a ride from NYC. Around 6 miles at a moderate pace. Take the 9:50 train from GCT arriving in Cold Spring at 11 (fare: OW\$10.25/ Srs.\$6.75). You can also connect to this train by taking the 9:40 local at the Marble Hill station (one block from the 225th St. stop on the #1 subway) and changing at Croton-Harmon. Fare: OW\$7.75/Srs.3.75. Please use the restrooms on the train and please sit in the first or second open car. Drivers from NYC: Saw Mill River Pkwy. to exit 26, Route 9A North to Route 9 North to Route 403 West to Route 9D North to Route 301 (which is Main St. in Cold Spring), left on Main St. to its end at the Depot Cafe. Park temporarily in their parking lot or on a nearby street. Out around 4, but plan to hang around in Cold Spring for a while afterwards for some refreshment. Qualifying.

Sunday, October 4 • Garrison

Osborn Loop. Woods roads and trails, with a substantial uphill at the start (but no scrambling). Around 7 miles at a moderate pace. It is not necessary to register, but you must call or preferably email me beforehand to make sure that the hike is on, and if you need or can offer a ride from NYC. Take the 9:50 train from GCT arriving in Garrison at 10:56. (fare: OW\$10.25/Srs.\$6.75). You can also connect to this train by taking the 9:40 local at the Marble Hill station (one block from the 225th St. stop on the #1 subway) and changing at Croton-Harmon. Fare: OW\$7.75/Srs.3.75. Please use the restrooms on the train and please sit in the first or second open car. Drivers from NYC: Saw Mill River Pkwy. to exit 26, Route 9A North to Route 9 North to Route 403 West to Garrison station. Park in the large commuter parking lot on the east side of the station. Out in time for the 5 pm train back to NYC. Qualifying.

Saturday, October 17 • Bronx Botanical Garden

Chrysanthemum show in conservatory, plus conifers & primeval forest walk. Maybe 3 or 4 miles at a very leisurely pace. Take the 10:23 Harlem Line train from Grand Central, arriving at the "Botanical Garden" Station at 10:42. Fare OW \$3.25 with "City Ticket." Alternatively, take the 4 or D subway to "Bedford Park Blvd." and then the #26 bus east to the Mosholu Gate entrance -- or, the 2 subway to "Allerton Ave." and then the #26 bus west to the entrance. Meet just inside the Mosholu Gate at 10:45. Admission to the Gardens is free on Saturdays until noon, but there is a fee for admission to the conservatory. If driving, park in the lot by the station (\$10) or on a nearby street. No coordination of rides. Visit will end by 3 but, of course, you are free to leave earlier or stay later.
