New Bathing Beach Safety Plan

Read the Brochure - View the Slides - Complete the Acknowledgement Form

The New York State Department of Health (DOH) has mandated changes to all group camp's Bathing Beach Safety Plan (BBSP). Camp Nawakwa's updated BBSP has been approved by the DOH.

In order to swim at Camp Nawakwa, there must be two keyholders not in the water at all times. No person can swim at Camp Nawakwa unless there is a Level IV Supervisor present and an Observer on the dock.

To become a Level IV Supervisor or Observer, keyholders need to read and sign off on both the BBSP (also a section of the Applicant/Sponsor Handbook) and the Slide Presentation Narrative located under Keyholders Info. on adkny.org. The BBSP and the Slide Presentation Narrative contain the updated waterfront safety rules and emergency rescue procedures.

All swimmers (keyholders, applicants, guests) must read and sign off on a mandated brochure "Use of Camp Nawakwa Swimming Facilities". The brochure is located under Keyholder Info. on adkny.org, as well as copies on the registration desk in the lodge, with an Acknowledgment Sign-Off sheet.

The updated BBSP, Slide Presentation Narrative, and Brochure will be available on <u>adkny.org</u> the first week of August along with a Confirmation Form to sign that keyholders have read them.

Injuries can be prevented, and safety is everyone's responsibility. Please read the safety rules posted at the entrance to the swim dock. If you have any questions, we will be happy to discuss them with you.

Camp Nawakwa Contributes to the Fight Against Invasive Species in Harriman State Park

Camp Nawakwa is involved in two conservation projects involving invasive species.

We are participating in the ongoing Invasive Species Task Force led by the New York/ New Jersey Trail Conference, against land based invasive species. As a continuation of the fall program, we contributed volunteers, as did the ACA camp on Sebago Lake, to the Task Force's June 12 workday to uproot and kill invasive species around Sebago Lake and along the road to Nawakwa. We destroyed hundreds of plants, focusing mainly on barberry bushes.

We are also involved in the AIS (aquatic invasive species) program being conducted by Teatown under the auspices of the NYS Dept of Environmental Conservation. On July 11 we and ACA volunteers were treated to a one-hour educational presentation on identifying and fighting aquatic invasive species. This was followed by 2 hours in canoes and kayaks surveying part of Lake Sebago to discover the extent of the invasion of non- native species (which have ruined many lakes in the area). We searched for invasive animal life such as clams and snails as well as invasive plants. Though invasive species are present, we discovered that, at this time, there is not a major problem in the lake. Harriman State Park employees are scheduled to do a full survey of the lake at the beginning of August. I have asked for the report from that work to be sent to the Nawakwa Board of Directors when it is completed.

Saturday, August 7, 2021 – The Appalachian Trail (Elk Pen to Fingerboard Mountain)

Join in hiking the very first six-mile section of the Appalachian Trail (1923). The hike also commemorates the 100th anniversary of Benton MacKaye's publication of his 1921 article that proposed a 2000-mile walking path from Maine to Georgia. It all got started here in Harriman, through the efforts of Raymond Torrey (our first Chapter Chair) and members of the New York Chapter who cleared and blazed this portion of the AT [see related articles on pages 9 and 10].

Starting from Elk Pen parking area off Route 17, we will follow the AT over to the shelter on Fingerboard Mountain, overlooking Lake Tiorati. The return trip will use the AT, the Long Path, and the Arden-Surebridge trails to return to the cars at the Elk Pen parking area. Bring lunch, water, rain gear, and appropriate hiking shoes.

This is a moderately strenuous hike that starts with a good climb from the parking area up to Island Pond. Length: about 10+ miles and is Qualifying. Meet at the Elk Pen parking area at 9AM. Come earlier if possible as the parking area is on the small size.

A Sponsor is a current, active Nawakwan who has been a keyholder for at least one year and who agrees to help the Applicant learn about camp and the responsibilities of membership so that the Applicant may successfully complete the process of qualifying" (Sponsor-Applicant Handbook)

At the October 1922 meeting of the newly formed Adirondack Mountain Club, Raymond Torrey was asked to form a New York Chapter. By early 1923, formal approval was given by the Main Club for the establishment of the New York Chapter, with Raymond Torrey as our first Chapter Chair. So, in 2023, we will be celebrating our 100th Anniversary!

Historic Hikes

As part of our anticipating the New York Chapter's 100th Anniversary, we are outlining a series of 'historic hikes' in which we try to recreate early hikes and visit places treasured by that first generation of chapter members.

The Appalachian Trail (Excerpts taken from Vista & Vision – A History of the New York-New Jersey Trail Conference by Glen D. Scherer, 1995)

"While the building of the R-D [the first trail in Harriman Park] had been daunting work for Torrey and company, the clubs faced a far greater challenge in 1922. This challenge was offered to them by regional planner Benton MacKaye. His 1921 article in the *Journal of the American Institute of Architects*, calling for a 2,000-mile walking path from Maine to Georgia, electrified Palisades Interstate Park Trail Conference members. Suddenly, the 24 finished miles of the R-D were no longer an end in themselves, but a dress rehearsal for big trails to come.

"MacKaye pictured "a series of recreational communities throughout the Appalachian chain of mountains from New England to Georgia, these to be connected by a walking trail. The building and protection of this Appalachian Trial, wrote MacKaye, would be a job for some 40,000 souls, a partnership between local groups of volunteers, private landowners, and state and federal park and forest officials. MacKaye's 40,000-person volunteer army "would be a giant in itself. It could walk the skyline and develop its varied opportunities...for recreation, recuperation and employment in the region of the Appalachian skyline." MacKaye saw his trail as a means of revitalizing the spirits of harried urban workers from the East's industrial cities, and as an antidote to "the shackles of commercial civilization." It would provide outdoor experience, perspective, and challenge to all who participated.

"On April 25, 1922, the clubs met again at the Log Cabin atop Abercrombie and Fitch, this time to talk with MacKay about his proposal. Representatives from more than twenty outdoor groups and agencies unanimously voted to dissolve their old organization and create a new one, dedicated to the bigger task of building the Appalachian Trail (A.T.). At that moment, the Palisades Interstate Park Trail Conference was reborn as the New York-New Jersey Trail Conference. Major Welch was selected as Chairman of the group (a post he would hole until 1931). Other officers selected were New York Vice-Chair, William Bell (AMC); New Jersey Vice-Chair, C.P. Wilbur (NJ State Fire Warden); Trails Chair, J. Ashton Allis (GMC); Publicity, Frank Place (Tramp and Trail Club); and Secretary, Raymond H. Torrey, outdoor writer for the *New York Evening Post*.

"That same night Allis called for volunteers to begin scouting the 160-mile A.T. route from Kent, Connecticut to the Delaware River. The clubs responded with tremendous enthusiasm.

By October 1923, Torrey and Allis had scouted the very first 6-mile section of the Appalachian Trail from the Ramapo River to Fingerboard Mountain in Harriman State Park, and volunteers from the Adirondack Mountain Club [*i.e.*, the New York Chapter -RMK] had cleared and blazed the trail...By January 4, 1924, twenty continuous miles of Appalachian Trail crossed Bear Mountain/Harriman Parks. This section, the first portion to the 2,100-mile long-distance trail to open, ran from the Erie Railroad station at the Ramapo River, up Green Pond Mountain, and through the cleft of the Lemon Squeezer. It then used sections of the Tail Conference's new R-D, Ardern-Surbridge, and Timp-Torn trails to reach the Hudson."

Benton MacKaye



Born March 6, 1879, Stamford, Connecticut Died December 11, 1975 (aged 96), Shirley, Massachusetts

"Benton MacKaye was an American forester, planner, and conservationist. After studying forestry at Harvard University, Benton later taught there for several years. He joined a number of Federal bureaus and agencies, including the U.S. Forest Service, the Tennessee Valley Authority, and the U.S. Department of Labor; he was also a member of the Technical Alliance where he participated in the *Energy Survey of North America*.

"MacKaye helped pioneer the ideal of land preservation for recreation and conservation purposes, and was a strong advocate of balancing human needs and those of nature; he coined the term "Geotechnics" to describe his philosophy...A co-founder of the Wilderness Society, he is best known as the originator of the Appalachian Trail (AT), an idea he presented in his 1921article titled *An Appalachian Trail: A Project in Regional Planning*, published in the October issue of *Journal of the American Institute of Architects*.

"...The article triggered sixteen years of effort, organized through hundreds of local trail associations and community groups, to blaze and build a 2,140-mile trail along the crests of the Appalachian Mountains." (Excerpts taken from the Wikipedia article on Benton MacKaye.)
