2022 Treasurer Report

Insurance and rent continue to be Nawakwa's largest expenses on an annual basis. The Park allows Nawakwa a discount of up to 25% total rent due should we incur any major capital improvements (MCI) on Park approved repairs to our campsite which is something we, as a whole, always try to utilize. General annual costs necessary to keep camp running are carefully considered and have run fairly consistent. Historically, we have run a small deficit which we have been able to offset with savings and in some years through donations. The year 2019 was an exception to that as Nawakwa received a considerably generous donation from a member.

<u>Camp's one-time significant expenses in the recent past included the following:</u>

- \$50,000: Donation settlement to ADK in 2022
- \$106,821: Legal fees to settle litigation 2021 2022
- \$40,000: New main cabin roof in 2021

We are encouraged by the enthusiasm and support of our members and have seen a strong interest in members renewing passports as well as strong camp attendance generating fee income throughout the camp season. The financial report points out the strength of Passport and Camp fee income received. Thank you all for your continued support and we look forward to moving ahead going forward with strength as our new entity, Nawakwa Outdoor Association.

Annual Palm Sunday Hike

St. John's Church in the Wilderness Sunday - April 2, 2023

Barring any late snowstorm, the good people of St. John's Church in the Wilderness plan to host the traditional Palm Sunday hikers' event on April 2nd this year. A light lunch will be provided by the parishioners. (Note: The Barn itself is not usable due to needed repairs. If the weather is fair, tables will be set up in the field near the Barn. If the weather is poor, the lunch will take place inside using the Church's meeting rooms.) The luncheon is scheduled for 2PM. There is no charge for the food and drink, but donations are always welcomed. The annual Palm Sunday hike to St. John's Church in the Wilderness has been a tradition since the 1930's. Other groups from other hiking clubs are out this day headed to St. John's, and it is very common to cross paths with them as we hike along.

There will be two groups for the hike, one led by Ray Kozma taking a 'traditional' route that will take us along Breakneck Pond and go through the AMC camp, and one led by Lewis Ports who will take the trails on the ridge above Breakneck Pond. Both groups will start together from the gate at 7 Lakes Drive. At a rest stop at Diamond Creek, the groups will separate, meeting up later at the church.

Since this is a one-way hike, please note:

All who are driving should meet at the Church by 9AM where the cars will be parked. All cars, except for the one or two that will shuttle hikers/drivers back to our starting point, will be left at the Church where the hike finishes. The hike will start from the Camp gate and Seven Lakes Drive about 10 AM. The address of the church is 119 Johnstown Road, Stony Point, NY between Lake Welch Parkway and Route 106.

Palm Sunday is in early April this year and early Spring weather can be unpredictable. Rain, some cold, blustery weather, including snow and ice, are always a possibility. Participants should dress warmly (layers, no cotton), bring lunch, snacks, water, raingear, and wear sturdy hiking shoes. Traction devices are recommended in case there is ice on the trail.

In Memoriam



ELIZABETH RUIZ-GOMEZ JANUARY 7, 1969 – OCTOBER 1, 2022

In October, we learned the sad news of the passing of our fellow Nawakwan, Elizabeth Ruiz-Gomez. Our condolences to Carol and Bill Burns on the loss of their daughter. A memorial weekend in honor of Elizabeth is being planned for a weekend at Camp Nawakwa in the Spring. What follows is from her obituary.

Elizabeth Ruiz-Gomez (nee Burns) was born in Staten Island, New York, to William and Carol Burns. She attended St. Adalbert's School and Notre Dame Academy High School. She graduated from Marymount College in Tarrytown, New York, where she majored in accounting and minored in history. Following her graduation, she worked in accounting and human resources for Deloitte until the birth of her first son, Julio, when she decided to exit the workforce to focus on raising her child. Three years later, she welcomed a second son into the world, Oliver. Upon the completion of two master's degrees in education concentrating on childhood and special education at Wagner College, she reentered the workforce as a special education teacher in the New York City Department of Education. Over the next fourteen years, she had a positive impact on the lives of countless young children with special needs.

Throughout her life, she was active in various charitable and religious organizations. She worked as a lifeguard and yoga instructor at the YMCA; volunteered at the Wagner College Early Childhood Center; held various leadership positions within Troop 26 of the Boy Scouts of America; helped organize the Bread of Life Food Drive through the Notre Dame Club of Staten Island; and was on the parish council of Blessed Sacrament Church.

Elizabeth became a Keyholder in October of 2005. From the beginning she was involved with activities at camp. She was very active in hosting weekends and co-hosted at least one weekend each year with her mom, Carol. Elizabeth was often a mid-week host by herself beginning in June 2005. Early on, she had helped host a yoga session at camp. She volunteered in the 2007 for Spring Cleanup and soon cheerfully took up the providing of lunch for a number of cleanup work days over the years. The last such lunch she prepared was for the work day held on August 27 of 2022. The following are memories of Elizabeth.

"I had the pleasure of working alongside Elizabeth when we last voted in person at the Sloatsburg library for our annual Nawakwan Elections. I found Elizabeth to be a kind, helpful and cheerful person. Elizabeth also enjoyed hosting at camp where many had the opportunity to share her delicious meals. She will be missed by many. May she rest in peace." - Eve Mancuso

"Elizabeth was a special education teacher in Staten Island, much loved by students, parents, and staff, and she was a devoted loving mother, daughter, and sister. She had an infectious laugh and made everyone feel comfortable. The last time I saw her and spent time talking with her was when we served on the Tally Committee together (with her mother Carol) in October 2020...I remember that day in camp. Bill Burns was also outside with Elizabeth's sons, hiking nearby." – Janet Sibarium

"One-Hundred Years!"

This year, the Nawakwa Outdoor Association of New York, Inc. (formerly the New York Chapter, Inc.) is celebrating its Centennial Anniversary. To mark this special milestone in the club's history, the following events are being planned:

- 1. A Gala celebration will be held in the Fall. Details of this event will be posted online and in the Trail Marker once all has been finalized.
- 2. Two publications are in the works:
 - a. *Favorite Recipes of Camp Nawakwa*. We invite all members to share the recipes they have used either when hosting or think they would like to use in the future. - 3. Special after-dinner lectures will be presented at Nawakwa on designated Saturday evenings. These presentations will highlight significant people and events of the past hundred years that helped in the formation and development of the club and Camp Nawakwa.
- 4. A series of Centennial Hikes are being planned. These hikes, including at least one overnight backpack, will highlight both significant places in the history of the club as well as significant trails in Harriman Park blazed by our early members who, working in collaboration with other hiking groups at that time, spearheaded the development of the trails we continue to enjoy today.
