Notification of NOANY Annual Membership Dues

The annual membership fee for Nawakwa keyholders remains \$40 in 2024, the same as in 2023.

If you are one of the 185 keyholders who were members at year-end 2022, your membership dues are payable in January 2024. You will receive an email notification early in January providing instructions for how to pay (check or Zelle).

If you are one of the 18 applicants who became keyholders between January and December 2023, you will receive a similar email notice one month prior to the 12-month duration of your initial membership fee. For example, if you became a keyholder in August 2023, you will receive a similar notification in July 2024.

Once your membership fee is processed, we will acknowledge receipt by email with a personalized Membership Card image.

This system is similar to the membership renewal notification process that keyholders were accustomed to as members of ADK.

Reminder: Off-Season Use of Camp Nawakwa

During the camp off-season from October 15 to April 30, permission to make use of Camp Nawakwa is needed from the Park Office for any keyholder who wishes to access and use camp during this period.

Any keyholder member who wishes to access and use camp during the off-season must notify Ray Kozma, NOANY Chair who will contact the Park Office to request permission and obtain the necessary Permit. Members should contact the chair about a week before the requested visit date so that sufficient time can be allowed for the Park Office to be notified and respond.

All the normal Park Rules and Regulations, and our established Policy and Procedures, will be in effect during the Off- Season.

Saturday, January 20, 2024 (in conjunction with the Hosted Weekend at Camp) Diamond Mountain Hike. 9am at Camp Nawakwa

Weather permitting. Snow, rain or icy conditions will cancel. The hike is followed by lunch at the cabin (with overnight hosted by Lewis Ports and Rosanna Romagnano, see page 4 for details).

Starting at camp we will make our way along the camp road toward 7 Lakes Drive which we will cross to access the "Tuxedo Mt Ivy Trail". We will only stay for a short distance on the TMI before we turn right onto the "Stony Brook Trail" and then left onto the orange "Hillburn-Torne-Sebago Trail".

Soon the ascent starts, and we will definitely get a workout. After 0.6 miles the trail merges with the "Seven Hills Trail" and we will be rewarded with a gorgeous view of our very own base- Lake Sebago. After another 0.2 miles we've reached the summit of Diamond Mountain (1240 ft). At this point we will follow the blue "Seven Hills Trail" for about 0.7 miles with several great vistas along the way before descending and making a right onto the "Kakiat Trail". This is a rather steep descent that requires rock scrambling skills.

After 0.6 miles on the "Kakiat Trail" we will make a right onto the "Stony Brook Trail". After a relatively flat 1.4 miles we'll be back at 7 Lakes Drive and return to camp where we will be greeted with well-deserved warm chili.

Note: This hike includes a steep ascent and descent, some rock scrambling, and the pace will be a little faster than on some of the other hikes

Distance: Approx. 5 miles (a qualifying hike)

Approx. total ascent 632 ft.

Participants need to wear sturdy footwear, dress in layers (no cotton please), and bring snacks, rain gear and a sufficient amount of water (hot drink in a thermos is nice too). Hiking poles are recommended. Traction devices are strongly recommended!

Annual Palm Sunday Hike

St. John's Church in the Wilderness Sunday – March 24, 2024

The annual Palm Sunday hike to St. John's Church in the Wilderness has been a tradition since the 1930's. Other groups from other hiking clubs are out this day headed to St. John's, and it is very common to cross paths with them as we hike along.

Barring any snowstorm, the good people of St. John's Church in the Wilderness plan to host the traditional Palm Sunday hikers' event on March 24th this year. [Due to the unavailability of clergy, there will not be a 3PM service for hikers. There is the regular church service at 12:30pm, however, and any who are at the church early are welcome to join with the parishioners at the 12:30 service.]

As part of their hospitality mission, the parishioners will provide a light lunch for hikers. The luncheon is scheduled to start at 2PM. There is no charge for the food and drink, but donations are always welcomed.

All who are driving should meet at the church by 9AM where the cars will be parked. All cars, except for the one or two that will shuttle hikers/drivers back to our starting point, will be left at the church where the hike finishes.

[Note: We are told that the road by the church has been torn up by the park, but not yet repaved. Drivers are urged to drive carefully as there are many ruts and uneven surfaces on the roadway by the church.]

The hike will start from the Camp gate and Seven Lakes Drive about 10 AM. The address of the church is 119 Johnstown Road, Stony Point, NY between Lake Welch Parkway and Route 106.

Palm Sunday is in March this year and March weather can be unpredictable. Rain, some cold, blustery weather, including snow and ice, are always a possibility. Participants should dress warmly (layers, no cotton), bring lunch, snacks, water, raingear, and wear sturdy hiking shoes. Traction devices are recommended in case there is ice on the trail.

Trail Maintenance:

A great day of hard work and camaraderie on 11/18/23

Seven participants (applicants, members and seasoned trail maintainers) gathered for a trails workday. For the benefit of newcomers, we outlined different aspects of the work we do and some safety related recommendations. Pages from the excellent *Trail Maintainers Manual* published by the New York New Jersey Trail Conference were available. Tools and safety glasses were chosen, and we set off to clear a portion of an overgrown trail.

Early rain and general dampness in the morning soon changed to clear sky and bright sunny conditions. We worked on a section of the White Cross trail which included rocky inclines and water crossings.

We worked at cutting encroaching branches to re-open a four-foot wide by eight-foot-high tunnel through dense Mountain Laurel. For a lunch break we sat on mossy rocks, ate our sandwiches, and chatted while a few late falling leaves spiraled down around us. Together we cleared 600-700 feet of trail before hiking back to camp. We returned with big appetites for the delicious dinner prepared by host and Board Member Alex Wilkie.

Many, many thanks are due to all our participants! Thank you for keeping alive our camp's 100+ year tradition of caring for the trails around us!

Policy and Guidelines for Published Outings and Non-Qualifying Hikes

In addition to official qualifying and non-qualifying hikes, (posted to our website and/or listed in the *Trail Marker* and led by qualified hike leaders), members also like to go on unofficial non-qualifying hikes, walks, and outings. If such unofficial hikes, walks, and/or outings are organized by a member and posted on our website or in the *Trail Marker*, thus becoming 'official,' the following procedures are to be followed:

- 1. A write-up of the planned event must be submitted to the Hikes and Outings Chair, who would, after approving, submit the write-up for posting.
- 2. For any event published under the auspices of the Nawakwa Outdoor Organization, a *Liability Waiver* must be signed by all participants. At the conclusion of the event, this waiver must be sent to the Chair of the Hikes and Outings Committee for the records.
- 3. Any leader/organizer of such an event should have taken a basic First Aid course. The following online course is recommended for a basic First Aid training: eCPR certification.com. If you have another First Aid course you would like to take or are able to take an in-person training, please make this request known.

Please Note:

- The Board has agreed to reimburse expenses for the basic First Aid training listed above. For other First Aid trainings, the leader/organizer must first get approval for such courses and for reimbursement before signing up.
- Most courses provide a two-year certificate, after which leaders will need to be re-certified.
- Anyone with qualifications beyond a standard First Aid training (for example, from their work) would be exempt from having to take the First Aid course. Please speak to the Hikes and Outings chair about this.
- A Certificate of Completion of a First Aid course would need to be submitted to the Hikes and Outings Committee.
- 4. A First Aid kit should be carried on all such events. NOANY will purchase for each leader/organizer a standard First Aid kit for use when leading such club events.

Congratulations to the New York Ramblers!

New York Ramblers Hiking Club Celebrates Its Hundredth Year Written by Ingrid Strauch

The year 1923 was notable for the formation of numerous outdoor organizations in the New York-New Jersey area. Among those organizations was the New York Ramblers Hiking Club, with an official founding date of October 25, 1923.

Hiking schedules from the 1930s show the club functioning then much as it does today: with weekly day hikes to area parks, including Harriman State Park, Storm King, what is now Ramapo Mountain State Forest, and more.

The club and its members are credited several times in Williams Myles' *Harriman Trails*, including for Jack Spivack's work blazing the Seven Hills Trail, starting in 1926; first Rambler president William Brien's donation of \$4,000 in 1954 to build a shelter at Island Pond; and former club president Kurt Ramig's contribution to a plan for the Long Path in 1961.

Today, the club hosts well-attended weekly hikes, usually on Sundays. Club members travel primarily by bus and train to and from trailheads in the Hudson Valley, Northern New Jersey, Long Island, and occasionally further afield. The club maintains a section of the Nurian Trail in Harriman State Park and honors Raymond Torrey with a hike to Long Mountain on the last Sunday of each October.

The COVID-19 pandemic had both positives and negatives for the club: On the plus side, membership grew as more and more people sought opportunities to hike and be in nature, but bus routes contracted, and some trailheads closed, making planning a varied and exciting hike schedule more of a challenge.

Nonetheless, the Ramblers are going strong, and members proudly received a mayoral proclamation in October 2023 in recognition of the club's contribution to the health and outdoor recreation of all New Yorkers.
