SATURDAY, April 13 - Parker Cabin Mt. from Rt. 17 Registration required.

Pace: slow up hill and moderate downhill. 1100 ' elevation gain in up and downs. A bit more than 5 miles, and qualifying.

Trails include Orange White, RD, Yellow triangle out and back from Parker Cabin Mt. Some trails are on old woods road, others on a smoothish surface, and much of the typical Harriman rocky surfaces from erosion. One stream crossing will build focus. Two climbs will meet your cardio pulmonary goals. From Parker Cabin Mt. we can survey the Camp's backyard. Dress for the weather forecasted the morning of the hike. Actual raining cancels. I go dreary to bright sunshine. Bring a lunch, a qt or 2 of liquid, good hiking boots, lunch, snacks, and a map to follow where we go. April sunshine can be strong since there are no leaves so a hat or sunblock might be useful.

Transportation: Short Line Bus, Port authority to Tuxedo, daily bus 9:10 to 10:12. Drivers meet riders at the commuters parking lot Tuxedo. It is the duty of any bus rider to call if the bus is going to be late. We will shuttle to commuter parking at 17a. During the hike we can figure out the best of options for riders returning to NYC.

Tree ID Hike Sunday, June 9, 2024 – 9:45AM

On Sunday, June 9, join Andy Frank and the Conservation Committee for a tree ID hike, beginning and ending at Kakiat County Park (on the other side of Harriman). We are hoping the mountain laurel will be in bloom! Feel free to bring your own tree identification materials if you'd like.

This 2.5-mile hike will involve some sustained climbing to get from the river up to the Harriman plateau, for a total ascent of about 700 feet and the same descent. This will be a short but moderately difficult hike.

Start time will be 9:45 AM, ending around 2:30 or 3:00. Hiking boots and two quarts of water required. Public transportation available.

In Memoriam Phyllis T. Quinn 1941 – 2023

We learned early in the new year that Keyholder member Phyllis Quinn passed away last August. Phyllis became an Applicant in June of 1960 and was a Keyholder member by September 1960. Phyllis sponsored a number of applicants and hosted weekends. She herself was chair of the Hosting Committee in 1992.

Many people do not remember this, but for many years there was a privately owned 575-acre tract of land sitting right in the middle of Sterling Forest and owned by a developer who planned to build 107 miniestates and an 18-hole golf course on it. There was a long battle, over many years, pitting local residents and preservationists against the proposed subdivision. I remember Phyllis as being very active at that time in advocating for the preservation of the whole of Sterling Forest. She attended meetings and spoke out passionately to anyone who would listen about the need to stop these development plans and preserve the entirety of Sterling Forest. Finally, after years of controversy, New York State in 2006 bought the land for \$13.5 million from the developer. – Ray Kozma

Below are excerpts from Phyllis's obituary:

It is with profound sadness that we announce the peaceful passing of our beloved Phyllis T Quinn, of Ocean Grove, who left this world on August 23rd. She joins her beloved late husband, Stanley, who preceded her in death, leaving behind an indelible legacy of love, compassion, and a deep passion for animals, and the outdoors.

Phyllis was not only a devoted wife, aunt, and grandmother, but she was a remarkable and tireless advocate for animals and the environment. Her heart held a special place for all creatures great and small, and she dedicated her life to the well-being of countless animals in need. Her home was a sanctuary for furry friends, and she showed boundless love and care for each one.

Phyllis's love for the outdoors was a defining feature of her life. She was a dedicated member of the Adirondack Mountain Club for over six decades. The mountains, forests, and lakes of the Adirondacks were her second home, and she reveled in the tranquility and beauty of the natural world.

Beyond her love for nature, Phyllis was an accomplished organist who shared her musical talents with friends and family. Her fingers danced on the keys, creating beautiful melodies that touched the hearts of those fortunate enough to hear her play. Her music was a reflection of her soul, full of grace and beauty.

Phyllis was also an avid photographer, capturing the world's wonders through her lens. Her photographs were a source of inspiration and awe, as she had an extraordinary ability to convey the essence and beauty of the natural world.

In Memoriam



John Lipsett 1933-2024

In reflecting on the passing of John Lipsett, we need to note the extraordinary dedication he had to Nawakwa, to the membership, to hiking, and to the trails we enjoy, as well as take note of the amazing list of accomplishments he was able to achieve. A search of our archives (researched by Ellen King), revealed that:

- John served on the Board of Directors in the following positions: Director 1984; New York Chapter Chair – 1985 – 1986; Governor – 1988 – 1990 [a Governor was our representative to the ADK Board of Directors]; New York Chapter Vice Chair – 1996 – 1997. He also served on the Conservation Committee, 1983-84.
- John was a hiker of legend: For 34 years he maintained the R-D trail and worked closely with the NYNJ Trail Conference. He led hikes in the Staten Island Greenbelt, in Stirling Forest, the Blue Mountain Reservation, the Hudson Highlands, hikes to Greenwood Lake, and numerous hikes in Harriman and Bear Mountain parks.
- John became a Keyholder in 1980 and quickly became mentor to applicants. In addition to sponsoring at least eleven applicants, he joyfully welcome new hikers to the dozens of hikes he led for our club.
- In 2014, in recognition and appreciation of John's dedicated service and significant contributions he provided to the club, we presented the White Birch Award to him. The award stated: This White Birch Award is presented to John Lipsett who, for over thirty years, has been a zealous and enthusiastic Hike Leader, introducing and inspiring many to know the joys of hiking and generously assisting numerous Applicants in qualifying for Keyholder status.

Those who met him will always remember how kind, pleasant, and generous a fellow he was. John will be missed but his legacy will continue to live on and inspire us. (See next page for excerpts from his obituary.)

It was perhaps 4 or 5 years ago, and I was on the last leg of a loop back to camp via Johnstown Circle and Claudius Smith Den on the TMI when a hiker approached coming the opposite way. My mouth dropped open in mock awe, "The famous Hiker!"

So we had a laugh about how "famous" he was. I asked if we would see him at camp any time soon, and he replied that he drops by now and then. So we continued on our separate ways, both enjoying the beautiful day.

OBITUARY OF JOHN LIPSETT, ESQ.

John G. Lipsett, Esq., 90, of New York City, passed away peacefully at home on March 11, 2024.

He was born September 17, 1933, in Philadelphia, PA to John and Beatrice (Souder) Lipsett. John is survived by his son, Edward Lipsett (Elizabeth) of Madison, CT along with one grandson, Nicholas Lipsett of Albany, NY. He is also survived by his sister, Ann Schiwall of PA and two nieces: Linda Schiwall and Susan Stroker.

John is preceded in death by his parents, wife, Rosalie (Harrill) Lipsett, son, John G. Lipsett Jr. and his granddaughter, Amanda Nicole Lipsett.

John grew up in Upper Darby, PA and after High school attended Swarthmore College (Phi Beta Kappa) -B.A. 55', University of Strasbourg, France 55-56 (Fulbright grant)" Certificat D'Etudes Francaises Modernes" 56', and Columbia University Law School LL.B. 59'.

He was admitted to the New York bar in 1959 and had been a practicing attorney up until his passing. In 1970, he joined with Forsythe, Holbrook, Seward & Bovone and then with Patton, Eakins, Lipsett, Martin and Savage Law firm from 1991 to present when the two firms merged together.

Throughout the years, he was involved in the Democratic Party in New York City, serving as Treasurer and President of the Riverside Democrats in the late 60's and recently was also on the Board of Directors of the Morningside Heights Historic District Committee working to preserve the historic beauty and architecture in his local community.

He was an outdoor enthusiast with a passion for hiking. He was a member of the Adirondack Mountain Club (ADK) which he had also served as chairman for a period, and the New York/New Jersey Trail Conference (NYNJTC). He had maintained a trail within Harriman State Park for 34 years in which he had led many hikes.

On his bucket list was to visit all 50 states, which he almost achieved. He was also both an avid NY Yankees and NY Rangers fan. John loved history and art, visiting many museums throughout the city and the country.

He was a generous and kind man, donating to many charities and organizations throughout his life. He will be deeply missed by his family and friends.
