2024 Nawakwa Outdoor Association of NY, Inc. Annual Meeting Treasurer Report

FINANCES NOA finances are currently in good standing. Camp insurance and Rent due to the Park (PIPC) continue to be Nawakwa's largest annual expenses. Our lease agreement with the Park allows Nawakwa a discount of up to 25% total rent due should we incur any major capital improvements (MCI) on Park approved repairs to our campsite, which is something we always try to utilize. We had the opportunity to utilize this discount against 2024 rent by building the kayak boat dock for camp, reducing rent by \$1368.25.

Specifically, Nawakwa's significant 2024 expenses include the following (also posted to NOA website):

- Directors & Officers Insurance: \$1,005.00
- Liability Insurance: \$9,832.09
- 2024 Rent: \$4,014.75

General annual costs necessary to keep camp running are carefully considered and have run fairly consistent. Over the last few years, we have run a small deficit which we have been able to offset with savings and in some years have offset it through donations. Just recently we have received a generous bequest from longtime member, Helga Feder, who passed away Nov 2022. She bequeathed 2.5% of her Estate to Nawakwa. This donation will be helpful in offsetting some of our larger expenses as well as an assurance for having cash on hand as needed for camp repairs and maintenance as needed.

Significant 2024 Income sources to date Include the following (also posted to NOA website):

- Camp Fees: \$3,245
- Passport Members: \$7,800
- 2024 Annual Fees paid: \$7,920
- Annual Appeal Donations: \$4,205

TAXES As a social club exempt from federal income tax, we are qualified as a 501c7 nonprofit organization. We file form 1099N with the IRS annually to report income, investment income, etc.

INSURANCE Historically, fellow NOA member David Miller, served as our insurance representative providing NOA D&O and Liability insurance coverage through Philadelphia Insurance. He has retired recently and we congratulate him on this and thank him for assisting camp over the years. We now have a new representative, with our premium remaining as is, as far as we know. Since insurance coverage is a considerable component of NOA expenses, we assessed the insurance market overall, have done due diligence and received quotes from other insurance companies for camp coverage. We have determined our premiums are in-line with reasonable insurance expenses for comparable clubs and activities covered in the policies. Our premiums paid and coverage provided through our Liability and D&O policies have been determined to be standard and adequate.

Conservation Committee Report

Conservation Committee Report

The Conservation Committee is aiming to host three activities this season. The first activity, a tree I.D. hike, was cancelled due to low enrollment and potentially inclement weather. We hope to reschedule the hike for later this year. In July members of the committee met to assemble spotted lanternfly traps, which are now suspended from trees around camp. We hope to offer a third activity, such as a lecture, later this year.

In other conservation-related news, the Park has been treating our area for two invasive species: spongy moths and *Hydrilla*. Spongy moths had a significant impact on foliage throughout the park, as anyone hiking beyond camp would have witnessed. The Park's spray treatment of trees on Nawakwa land had a noticeable effect. The Park is also still treating Lake Sebago to reduce *Hydrilla*, an invasive plant. Most treatment occurred in the north basin of the lake. We should all continue to keep an eye on our dragonfly and damselfly populations and diversity, as they can indicate problems with our water quality. Currently the populations seem to be going strong!

Environmental Education Committee Report

REPORT FROM THE ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The Environmental Education Committee (EEC) educates its members and takes positions on, and advocates for, important environmental issues; we contact the relevant politicians, groups, agencies etc, locally, regionally, nationally & internationally to make our voices heard.

Since last year's Open Board meeting, the EEC

- Celebrated the end of radioactive waste dumping in the Hudson River.
- Emailed NYS Gov Hochul to urge nuclear waste stay on site @ Indian Point (the least terrible option), not vaporized or sent elsewhere.
- Forwarded a letter to NYS Gov Hochul urging her not to allow Southern Tier Solutions, a private company, to use Carbon Dioxide derived from fossil fuels to produce more fossil fuels.
- Forwarded a Food and Water Watch Forum presentation on keeping radioactive waste out of our air and water.
- Urged our members to sign onto a letter to Pres. Biden to order the Army Corps of Engineers to revoke Formosa Plastics' Federal Permits, thus stopping 12.6 million tons of greenhouse gases & over 800 tons of toxic chemicals per year into our air and water.
- Urged our Members to contact their NYS Senators for them to support the CO2 Fracking Ban bill already passed by the Assembly.(regrettably was blocked from a full Senate vote)
- Signed a petition to the Federal Environmental Protection Agency to ban bee-killing pesticides.
- Signed a petition to President of Mexico Lopez Obrador urging a ban on cancer causing Glyphosate (no longer sold in the US).
- Signed onto a letter to the EPA to ban Vinyl Chloride, a poisonous carcinogen.
- Signed onto a statement to the EPA to determine that the health of the ecology and humans is not being protected.
- Alerted Members to the free Consumer Guide available from Food and Water Watch to identify the many products containing PFAS, the "forever chemicals" so as not to use them
- Urged writing NYS Assemblyperson to demand the Climate Change Superfund Act be brought to a vote (already passed by the NYS Senate). It would force the fossil fuel industry to pay for climate change damage in NYS. (not brought to a vote).

Report for the July 1, 2023–June 30, 2024 Period Open Board Meeting - August 14, 2024

The Trail Maintenance Committee has continued to be active. Nawakwa is responsible for maintaining 20.3 miles of trail, including segments of the Appalachian Trail, Long Path, Ramapo-Dunderberg, Triangle, Tuxedo-Mount Ivy, White Bar and White Cross.

On November 18, 2023, the Committee held a trail maintenance event to work on a segment of the White Cross Trail near Black Ash Swamp. Seven people participated, and we were able to clear quite a bit of mountain laurel and other vegetation from encroaching on the trail.

On April 20, 2024, the Committee held a trail maintenance event to work on the southernmost segment of the White Bar Trail. Thirteen people, including five applicants, attended, and this large group made great progress in clearing a particularly gnarly and difficult section of trail that is threatened by lots of thorny plants.

More generally, Nawakwa trail maintainers have put in at least 153.75 hours of work during the July 1, 2023 – June 30, 2024 period. Below is a list of assigned maintainers and their hours worked during the reporting period; note that trail maintainers and other members may have worked additional hours maintaining camp trails.

Hiking Weekend September 21-22



Hosting Committee Report

Nawakwa Hosting Committee Report '24

August 1,2024

Overall, despite camp closings due to storm and repair work, we are having a solid season. In general, the hosted weekends have increased participation with a marked increase in overnight stays at camp.

The following report is based upon information received by August 1, 2024. The camp season ranges this year from April 27, 2024 to October 13, 2024, the official closing of camp.

Hosted Weekends

Out of a possible 25 weekends, 16 weekends were slated to be hosted weekends. July 1-5 was a hosted midweek. Two hosted weekends had to be cancelled due to the storm. Nawakwa lunches were also provided by the camp for workers on Workdays. We are looking for lunch hosts for our Fall Work Weekend/October 12-13.

The following six (6) weekends are open for hosting: 8/17-18; 8/24-25 (Camp Maintenance Day); 9/7-8; 9/28-29; 10/5-6; 10/12-13.

Need for More Volunteers

Of the 16 hosted weekends, most of the hosts are seasoned volunteers who host nearly every year. Several host more than one weekend: Lewis Ports, Susanne Flower, Janet Sibarium, Yajing Li, Ray Kozma, Mary Hilley, Maryann Poris, Deirdre Tourin, Eve Mancuso. New to hosting this year is Laura Zan. A Hiking Weekend has been organized this year by Lewis Ports for 9/21-22. He is establishing a new model of hosting for this weekend: Individual hike leaders will be cooking/hosting with their "teams" of hikers. Lewis Ports and Eve Mancuso will also be hosting an ambitious Labor Day Weekend. The question remains: How, as an organization, can we recruit more hosting volunteers?

More Overnight Stays

The fact that we have more overnight stays in camp compared to previous years suggests greater enthusiasm for hiking and camp life, the condition of the cabins, and an increasing "younger" population. For example, in the week of July 4th, there were 17 overnights; in the week of July 8th, there were 11 overnights. The overnights and the hosted dinners themselves have a mix of older members, newer members, and guests/applicants.

The Hosting Committee agrees that Nawakwa is doing well as a hiking, conservation, social club but would like to see more volunteers. (Commissary runs on an approximate budget of 400.00. We may want to reinstitute a commissary charge per meal to increase (or offset) our funds. Foodstuffs, cleaning supplies, paper goods etc. have all increased in price as have our numbers in attendance at the hosted weekends.)

We, the Committee, emphasize our help to the hosts and the idea that one needs to prepare simple, doable, cost-effective meals.
